

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The Doctor and his friends were taken to Skaro, where he learned of the Emperor's real plan: to take control of the Doctor's mind using the Dalek Factor and have him use the TARDIS to spread it throughout the history of Earth. The Doctor proved to be immune to the procedure due to his alien psychology. but pretended to be a Dalek slave. Meanwhile, the Alpha, Beta and Omega test Daleks were seeding the Human Factor into Dalek society, encouraging independent thought in their fellow Daleks. The humanised Daleks rebelled against the Emperor and a civil war broke out. The Emperor was destroyed, and the Daleks were all but completely wiped out in the conflict.

The second Dalek civil war was born out of a schism between Davros and his Dalek 'children'. The Daleks had been genetically programmed to always consider any non-Dalek lifeform as inferior and deserving of extermination. Davros was not a Dalek, and therefore could not be obeyed. The Daleks only revived him when they had a use for him – first to find a way to break the stalemate in the war between themselves and the robotic Movellans, and again when the Movellans released a bio-engineered plague upon the Daleks, and they needed Davros to find a cure. But Davros always understood that he was living on borrowed time when in the presence of his creations and sought a solution.

Davros escaped the Daleks after an encounter with the Fifth Doctor and eventually established himself on the planet Necros at Tranquil Repose, a funeral centre with many deceased humans being kept in storage. Calling himself the 'Great Healer', Davros used the enormous amount of genetic material

at his disposal to create an entirely new Dalek species that was obedient only to him. The fact that these Daleks had no Skarosian ancestry meant nothing to Davros - they were his creations, and therefore, in his mind, true Daleks.


The original Dalek race believed otherwise. They had been searching the galaxy for Davros for years, and moved swiftly when they were contacted by humans on Necros alerting them to his location. Daleks battled one another in the corridors of Tranquil Repose, but Davros' Daleks were too few and were soon wiped out. When the Daleks captured Davros, they told him, "You are to be taken back to Skaro to stand trial for crimes against the Daleks."

The concept of a Dalek trial is a fascinating one – perhaps Davros still had some support among the Supreme Council. making a simple execution out of the question? Or perhaps the Supreme Dalek merely wished a show trial that could be witnessed by all Daleks, with Davros' death cementing its authority once and for all? Whatever the case, there was an astonishing turnaround in Davros' fortunes the next time the Doctor (in his seventh incarnation) confronted him. The malevolent genius had somehow overthrown the Supreme Dalek and wrested control of the Dalek Empire for himself.




The Daleks, who had previously sworn allegiance to the Supreme, were now considered 'Renegades'. The Imperial Daleks now conformed to Davros' design, with their armour coloured white with gold livery.

It is only natural that the Daleks sometimes wage war with one another. They are a species conditioned to believe in genetic superiority. They have no compassion, and no understanding of the strength that can be found in cooperation. They have only hatred in their hearts, and that mindset inevitably leads to internecine conflict. With the concept of purity so vital to their sense of identity, it takes only a slight change before the Daleks look upon their fellows as lesser creatures - and for a Dalek, the inferior must always be exterminated.



THE DALEK



In 1960s London, the Doctor discovers that the Daleks are in search of the Hand of Omega.

arth, November 1963. As the world turns, radio broadcasts of recent political events are being monitored by a malevolent alien intelligence. A massive spacecraft approaches the fragile blue planet...

Shoreditch, London. Professor Rachel Jensen passes some children outside Coal Hill Secondary School. A young blonde schoolgirl watches her, and then turns her attention to the Doctor and Ace as they also enter the street. Ace is carrying a 1980s ghetto blaster. The Doctor is intrigued by a sophisticated radio aerial on top of a small van. Ace is more interested in finding some food and walks off to a nearby café. The Doctor climbs onto the van's roof to get a better look at the aerial.

Inside the café. Ace meets a fellow customer, Mike Smith. Ace is attracted to the handsome young man. Mike is






confused by Ace's ignorance of Britain's pre-decimal currency.

The young schoolgirl is playing hopscotch in the school playground, but runs away when the Doctor arrives. He examines some burn marks left on the ground, and then leaves. The girl reappears, quietly singing, "Five, six, seven, eight, it's a doctor at the gate..."

The Doctor jumps inside the van and introduces himself to Rachel. He notes that she is scanning for magnetic fluctuations.



She receives an emergency call from someone. She calls out to Mike, referring to him as "sergeant". Ace dives inside the van and all four of them speed off.

In a junkyard in Totter's Lane, Group Captain Gilmore puts a blanket over the body of a soldier named Matthews. The Doctor and Rachel arrive and examine Matthews. The Doctor probes his body and notes that there has been "massive internal displacement – his insides were scrambled". The Doctor says Matthews has been killed by a "projected energy weapon". Rachel is stunned: "A death ray?"

Mike runs to a second van and tells another scientist, Alison Williams, that Matthews is dead. A truck filled with soldiers arrives. Gilmore orders them to surround the metal shed where the weapon was fired. As Matthews' body is removed, another soldier is shot, his

skeleton briefly visible in the energy blast. Rachel is stunned to see the "death ray" in action. She is forced to admit, "It's beyond the realm of current technology." The Doctor tells Gilmore to pull his men back, but Gilmore refuses.

The soldiers destroy the shed with anti-tank rockets. Gilmore is convinced the enemy has been killed, but the Doctor is certain the danger is still very real.



Mike is almost killed by a third energy blast, and a Dalek emerges, unscathed, from the ruins of the shed. The soldiers' guns are useless against it. The Doctor takes some of Ace's Nitro-9 explosives and goads the Dalek to approach him. Detonating the Nitro-9, the Dalek is finally destroyed.

Rachel and Alison examine the remains of the dead Dalek mutant inside the shattered armour. The Doctor and Ace



LOOKING BACK...

While Silver Nemesis was the official 25th anniversary story for *Doctor Who* in 1988. Remembrance of the Daleks also had many elements that drew upon the show's history. Coal Hill School was where Ian Chesterton and Barbara Wright first met Susan, the Doctor's granddaughter, in the show's debut episode, An Unearthly Child. Ace finds a book on the French Revolution, echoing Susan reading a book with the same title. The Totter's Lane junkyard where the army battles the lone Dalek is the same place where Ian and Barbara discover the TARDIS and first meet the Doctor. The Doctor mistakenly calls Group Captain Gilmore "Brigadier" in a reference to his old friend Brigadier Lethbridge-Stewart.





take Rachel's van and head back to Coal Hill School. On the way, the Doctor explains the Daleks' origins to Ace and tells her that they want something called the "Hand of Omega".

Back at the army's headquarters, Mike introduces Gilmore to Mr Ratcliffe, a man



whom he claims can be of use to them. Meanwhile, Rachel and Alison discuss the Doctor. Rachel realises that the Doctor knows far more about the Daleks than they do, and she wants some answers from him.

The Doctor and Ace reach Coal Hill School, unaware that they are being observed once more by the schoolgirl. Inside, they are greeted by Mr Parson, the headmaster. He thinks the Doctor is there to apply for the role of caretaker. Parson is at first unwilling to let them look around the school, but then oddly changes his mind.

Mike tells Gilmore and Rachel that the remains of the Dalek in the Totter's Lane

junkyard is safely under guard. However, Ratcliffe and some of his men are soon loading it onto a truck and stealing it, having killed the two soldiers who were guarding it.

As the Doctor and Ace explore the school, the Doctor explains to Ace that the Daleks have been following him. He points out the burn marks on the playground which Ace correctly deduces must have been left by a spacecraft. Ace doesn't understand: "But this is Earth, 1963! Someone would have noticed; I'd have heard about it!" The Doctor mentions the Zygon gambit with the Loch Ness monster, and the Yetis in the London Underground. Ace has heard of neither of these events. The Doctor isn't surprised: "Your species has the most amazing capacity for self-deception, matched only by its ingenuity when trying to destroy itself!" The Doctor admits that when he was last on Earth in 1963,



CIVIL WAR

Writer Ben Aaronovitch was new to Doctor Who and was part of script editor Andrew Cartmel's drive to bring fresh writing talent into the show. Aaronovitch had submitted an unsolicited script titled Knight Fall to the production office that Cartmel had liked. Aaronovitch watched many Doctor Who Dalek episodes in preparation for his story which had a working title of Nemesis of the Doctor. He also read the scripts for some of the Dalek stories that were missing from the BBC archives. He decided to continue the concept of a Dalek civil war that had been established in the Season 22 story Revelation of the Daleks.





he left something behind: the Hand of Omega. Ace asks him what it is. The Doctor simply replies, "Something very dangerous..."

Ratcliffe takes the dead Dalek back to his warehouse. A rasping voice orders him to report. Ratcliffe enters his office and speaks to a sinister figure hidden behind a Dalek-shaped chair. It wishes to know


of the Doctor's movements. Ratcliffe assures it that his contact will keep them informed. Ratcliffe asks the figure to explain what the Dalek is. It replies, "A machine. A tool. Nothing more."

The Doctor and Ace are watched by Mr Parson as they open the door to the school's cellar. They walk down some stairs into the gloomy interior where they find a Dalek transmat device. A Dalek begins to materialise on a platform. The Doctor hurriedly manipulates the controls and causes an overload. The Dalek is destroyed as it phases out of existence. The Doctor

> explains that no more Daleks will be able to use the transmat until the operator can repair the system: "The Daleks usually leave an operator on station in case of any malfunctions." Ace works out the uncomfortable truth before the Doctor: "And that would be another Dalek..."

A second Dalek emerges from the shadows, gliding towards the duo. The Doctor yells to Ace to run back up the stairs. She does so, but is met by Mr Parson outside the cellar door. He knocks her to the ground and bolts the door shut, trapping the Doctor. The Doctor bangs on the door, yelling to Ace to let him

out. He turns to see the Dalek levitating. It is moving up the stairs towards him. "You are the Doctor!" it screeches. "You are the enemy of the Daleks! You will be exterminated!" The Dalek has the horrified face of the Doctor directly in its sights...







The story required the Dalek props to be used for a large amount of location work, so the decision was made to swap the usual castors for large ball-like tires. These enabled the Dalek operators to manoeuvre on the uneven London streets more easily. For the battle in Totter's Lane, the Renegade Dalek was constructed from an Imperial Dalek mould and was designed to blow apart on cue. Its skirt had originally been made for an effects scene in Revelation of the Daleks.

VOICES OF THE 605

The audio montage heard from space at the start of the episode were all speeches made in 1963. They consisted of: US President John F. Kennedy at Washington's American University (10th June): Charles de Gaulle in Paris (14th January): the Duke of Edinburgh in Nairobi (13th December); Martin Luther King in Washington DC (28th August); and John F. Kennedy again in Berlin (26th June).

THE SPECIA WEAPONS DALEK

While all Daleks are essentially living weapons, the Special Weapons Dalek takes that philosophy to the ultimate degree.

he Special Weapons Dalek was initially an experimental project initiated by the Daleks' creator Davros. After Davros took control of the Dalek Empire and installed himself as Emperor, he knew that the Renegade Dalek faction would always be the greatest threat to his power base. He decided to build a prototype Dalek that would function as a blunt instrument; it would be little more than a mobile cannon, wielding firepower far exceeding that of a typical Dalek. It would become a symbol of his might and instil fear in the ranks of the Renegade Daleks.

The Special Weapons Dalek has no eyestalk. This has always been the most vulnerable part of a Dalek, and Davros deemed it unnecessary. He replaced it with a movable sensor inside the casing which can rotate 360 degrees [1]. The creature's visual perception is far more limited than a typical Dalek, but it had never been intended for accurate warfare; it is a weapon of mass extermination. No form of manipulator arm was considered necessary. The Special Weapons Dalek is required to carry out no tasks other than to destroy.



The cannon fires a beam of concentrated neutronic particles, set at a far wider pattern than normal [2]. Its blast is at least 50 times more powerful than a standard Dalek weapon, although its range is no greater.

Supplying enough energy to the cannon requires an internal power unit with a much greater capacity than normal. But this means that the radiation levels emitted by the power unit are also far higher, and the Dalek mutant within its casing can not be properly shielded from them. Over time, the radiation altered the creature's brain chemistry, and it developed a sense of individual identity: something forbidden in Dalek society. The other Daleks shunned it, perceiving it to be an insane deviant. Only Davros' commands prevented them from obeying their basic impulse to destroy what they saw as a non-Dalek. The Special Weapons



Dalek became known to them, unofficially, as the "Abomination".



On the streets of London, Earth, in 1963, a battle to claim the Hand of Omega (a Gallifreyan stellar manipulator) took place [3]. The Imperial and Renegade Daleks were equally matched; their energy beams were deflected by each other's armour. But the tide was turned with the arrival of the Special Weapons Dalek. A single blast from its cannon [4] reduced two Renegade Daleks to ash.




The first Special Weapons Dalek [5] was destroyed when the Daleks' spacecraft was obliterated by the Hand of Omega. Davros deemed the Special Weapons Dalek a success, however, and set about refining the design and building an entire division of the creatures. He saw no problem with creating a subspecies of insane Daleks, as long as they could be deployed under controlled conditions. They have been sent on many campaigns against Renegade Daleks and other species.

Each Special Weapons Dalek is allocated a "Minder" Dalek that gives it specific instructions during combat missions. The Special Weapons Dalek will only follow the Minder Dalek's orders. If the Minder Dalek is destroyed or incapacitated in battle, the Special Weapons Dalek will become independent, and this sometimes leads to it self-destructing or turning on its own kind.

Even when under the direction of its Minder, the Dalek mutant often suffers from an overactive schrellic gland. The gland can become particularly active when the creature is in a battle situation. It excretes a noxious fluid which is believed to attract the attention of other Daleks, potentially as a signal for reinforcements. The amount of schrellic secretion is such that it often leaks out of the Special Weapons Dalek's casing around the cannon. This sticky fluid is sometimes confused for lubrication oil, although it possible that it is also used for this purpose.


The increased radiation levels have led to frequent bouts of insanity for the Dalek mutants placed inside the Special Weapons Daleks, and they remain an unpredictable factor in any form of combat. They are capable of episodes of uncontrollable anger and exhibit far higher levels of psychokinetic energy than their standard counterparts. Many Special Weapons Daleks were imprisoned inside the Dalek Asylum before the planet's destruction.

There have been at least two alternative variations of the standard Special Weapons Dalek design: one meant for underwater use, known as the 'Torpedo Dalek', and one for aerial combat referred to as the 'Airborne Dalek'.







Take the circuit board and battery box from issue 2. Fit 3 AA batteries in the box **2H** and plug the cable marked **G** into the large socket marked **G** on the circuit board **2D** (red arrow). Take

part 5B and plug the cable (marked LE) into the socket marked LD (yellow arrow). Switch on the battery box 2H. Press the button on the circuit board 2D to check that the light is working.







#05-03

Fit the side panel 5A on to the right hand side of the dome assembly from previous issue. Screw sockets on the panel fit into sockets in the dome 3F/3E (arrows).

#05-04

Turn the assembly upside down and identify the screw holes on the inside of the dome 3F/3E (circled).

Fix in place with four AM screws.
